Everything in nature is part of an enormous ecosystem that's been developing for centuries. Its size, diversity, and balance support all life and helps keep everything working as needed.

Australia's unique landscape is home to wildlife not found anywhere else in the world. It's important we work together to ensure they survive and thrive now and for future generations.

Victoria alone is home to over 600 native wildlife species and more than 5,000 species of native plants. They all have an essential and unique role in keeping our ecosystem healthy.

1. RESEARCH

What can we do as humans to keep our populations of native wildlife healthy?

2. REFLECT

What would Victoria look like without this species?

What would Victoria look like with more happy, healthy native wildlife?

What do <u>you</u> want tomorrow to look like?

3. CREATE!

Show us your ideas for a Wild Tomorrow.

What does a world with people and wildlife positively coexisting look like?

Be as creative as you want, whilst showing us what you learned from your research.

You can show us your Wild Tomorrow however you like, whether it's artwork, a video, a story, a poem or an essay.





SUBMIT. Guidelines

Submission criteria:

- Our Wild Tomorrow submission is open to all children in Victoria aged up to 15 years.
- Work can be submitted individually or as a group/class project.
- Submissions are open now until 31st May 2025.
- Submissions must depict or describe wildlife species native to Victoria. Submissions depicting non-native species will not be considered.
- Wild Tomorrow submissions can be any creative media. The entrant can choose whether it is visual (artwork) or descriptive (poems, stories, essays etc.)
- Submissions must be created solely by the child, and must be the child's original creation. Adults may only provide encouragement to the entrant, such as helping with research and transcribing young children's written work etc.

Submission guidelines:

- Please provide the name(s) of any participant(s), the school/organisation they are a part of (where relevant), email address and postal address. We'll only share first names and the organisation (where relevant). If any participants do not wish their name to be displayed with their submission please inform us accordingly. You can view our privacy policy here.
- All artworks must be submitted by an adult: either a parent/legal guardian, teacher or program manager. If a teacher or program manager is submitting the work, it is assumed they have received any necessary parent/legal guardian consent.
- Submissions must be received in a digital format, emailed to us at donations@wildlifevictoria.org.au. Please assist your child/student to create a clear digital copy of their original artwork, by either scanning a copy, taking a photograph or uploading as a PDF.
- By submitting your work, you give Wildlife Victoria permission to use and display any submissions on our website, social media and communications to our supporters.
